

Briefing to Incoming Government from the Hauraki Gulf Forum

November 2023

Tēnā koutou, dear all, the Hauraki Gulf is at a crossroads and you have a simple choice – is the future of the Gulf:

- The image on the cover of this briefing?
- · Or the image on the back?

As you know, the Hauraki Gulf is regionally, nationally and internationally significant. It is the seabird capital *of the world*, a whale superhighway, home to our largest city, and a \$100 billion natural capital asset.

But it is in real trouble. We are seeing: the rise of milky-flesh snapper; our whales ingesting three million pieces of microplastic a day; sediment-laden, polluted, acidifying and warming waters, black-flagged beaches, and the spread of invasive species like exotic *Caulerpa*.

The Hauraki Gulf is a taonga, a treasure to all New Zealanders, and there is no reason why it could not once again be among the most pristine, biodiverse and abundant coastal marine areas in the world. *All it takes is ambition*.

Ambition to:

- Protect 30% in marine protected areas
- Stem land-based impacts at source
- · Restore keystone species
- · End bottom-impact fishing
- Address challenges like kina barrens
- · Eradicate Caulerpa, and
- Empower mana whenua and local communities in the protection and restoration of their local area.

Set up a taskforce to reduce landbased impacts including sediment



Resource the removal and eradication of exotic *Caulerpa*



End bottom-impact fishing in the Marine Park



Investigate the RMS Niagara wreck and deal to risks identified



Support active restoration of key species & address kina barrens

Establish a process for achieving 30% marine protection by 2030



Support riparian planting of the catchment by land owners
